To the citizens of the City of Canal Fulton, for almost eight years, two terms of office, in one of the most rewarding communities and through some of the most difficult economic downturns this City, State and Nation has faced, since the last great depression, I thank you!

## Police Department – Chief David Frisone



### Visible Residential and Business Addresses

The Canal Fulton Police Department urges residents and business owners to make sure their street addresses are easily visible for first responders. It is estimated that as many as 20 to 30 percent of the approximately 2,500 homes, apartment buildings and businesses in the City either do not have address numbers on the structure or the numerals are obscured by vegetation or other objects. In some cases, the numbers are present but difficult to read due to size, color, script or location. The numbering on some homes has come off when the structures were remodeled, sided or re-painted.

Some neighborhoods have house numbers painted on the curb. Although these numbers are helpful, homeowners should not rely on them as the only form of numbering as they can be blocked by snow during winter or by parked cars. Address numbers should be placed in a prominent location such as near the front entrance and consist of 3 to 4 inch block characters that do not blend in with the background coloring. Residents should avoid using script numbers.

Later this fall, the police and fire departments will perform an inventory of city structures. Homes and businesses that are not in compliance with adequate address numbering will receive a letter requesting that they make the numbers visible from the street. Our goal is to ensure that we can respond rapidly to any location in Canal Fulton in the event of an emergency. We appreciate your cooperation and assistance in making our city a safe place to live, work and raise a family.

# Municipal Waste Collection Contract Update – Public Service Committee

The Public Service Committee has been studying the concept of only one city-wide trash hauler for residential households for the past several months. After two public meetings, we took into consideration the suggestions of our citizens. Again, we are seeking your input by completing the survey below and returning it to City Hall.

As we all experience rising costs and try to find ways to pinch our pennies, waste collection is one of those services where you are 'paying for trash'. In the last article we worked through an example of the potential savings, nearly 40% - 60% depending on your current billing. We now have a recent sample of a neighboring community's savings. The City of New Franklin just recently moved through this process. Their contract allows for small adjustments over the contract term, with a maximum of \$12.61 per month for unlimited service. This does not mean we will receive the same bid price; it is merely an indication of the savings we can produce for our families.

Many cities, villages and townships throughout Ohio have municipal waste collection contracts. Similar to the recent aggregation of electricity and natural gas within Canal Fulton; municipal waste collection contracts increase the collective buying power of the community. One company would haul all of the residential waste in Canal Fulton and have curbside recycling pickup. In order to win the exclusive contract; the hauler would have to be the lowest acceptable bidder for the service. That lower price is in turn passed on to the consumer...saving you money. The contract would be a public bid with bidding open to any company who can meet the contract specifications.

As a result of the comments and questions we received during the Public Meetings, we have developed a sample of what we are looking to include in our contract.

We look forward to receiving your input in the decision-making process.

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## Municipal Waste Collection Contract Survey

1. A choice of three levels:
  - A. 30-gallon bag service;
  - B. 96-gallon container service;
  - C. Unlimited, free pickup of bulky items
2. Recycling bin for plastics, paper and cardboard (as a separate service choice or possibly included at all levels of service)
3. Opt-Out option for current residents
4. No fuel and environmental charges can be added to the monthly price

Note: Commercial properties, homeowner associations and landlord contracted apartments would be exempt from the city contract. However, these entities could choose to join at a later date.

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# Fire Department – Chief Raymund Durkee



## What Do You Remember About 9-11-2001?

In 2000, I had the opportunity to take a youth church group to New York City. While there, we had some free time so I stopped at Engine 1 and Ladder 24 Fire House near the Empire State Building. My goal was to buy an FDNY company t-shirt. I had a short chat with the firefighters, just brotherly firefighter banter. I commented on a yellow taxi paint scrape on the truck and one of the firefighters bragged “that’s nothing, we have an engineer that can take a mirror off a taxi cab with the front tire and never swap any paint!”

On 9-11-2001, I was working in a church under construction in Lodi, Ohio. I heard on the radio playing a plane had struck one of the World Trade Center Towers. I thought what a terrible accident. I thought of all the casualties there would be and the tough fire fight the NYFD was in for. Then within minutes, I heard again over the radio that a second plane had struck the other World Trade Center Tower. I immediately thought two planes - no accident!

We are under attack. All work in the building stopped, as it did everywhere, and workers huddled around television monitors for news. A third report came in on the news that another plane had struck the Pentagon.

I received a page from my work, Stow Fire Department, recalling all personnel. I called in and said I was 3 hours away. The Chief said to get there when I could. I called home to make contact with my family and made the 3 hour drive. I learned coming home another plane was down in Pennsylvania. When I got to the station, I like others watched over and over the news coverage of the planes striking the buildings, firefighters responding, people fleeing, the towers falling, buildings burning, all while wondering who would do this and why.

Many firefighters responded to the rescue and relief effort. Many others, as well as myself, volunteered but were not called up.

It felt personal to me...as Flight 93 had flown so close to airspace over my home, and the hundreds of firefighters obviously dead or injured that were my brother firefighters, some of which I believe I had visited and spoken with the year before. It was eerie to go outside and not see planes in the sky or the contrails left by them in the atmosphere. The world stopped for a moment. Life in the United States of America would never be the same.

Over the next few days I wanted to hear stories of survival and rescue, but there were too few. Then I wanted to hear stories of recovered remains for closure to families, firefighters and the nation, but again not enough. I wanted to hear stories of our nation’s military forces rooting out the evil that caused this but again not soon enough.

It was an awkward sense of pride and tragedy to hear of the heroic efforts on Flight 93 that certainly saved many lives at the cost of their own.

The nation rallied. Support for New York City and its fire department were received in monetary donations and donations of fire trucks and ambulances. It developed a good feeling of civic and national pride to assist New York City’s recovery.

In the years that followed, I have attended several events commemorating the tragedy. Often the wounds were reopened and the emotions would again pour forth. On occasion a New York Fire Department member would speak. I remember one incident where a very young looking Captain was presenting. A large portion of the department had been affected by the incident, many members died, were injured, suffering from exposure disease, and many retired. New York Fire Department was young!

In 2007 I found myself again in New York, my daughter was singing with a college choir at Carnegie Hall. I once again went to visit Engine 1 and Ladder 24 Fire House. The doors were closed. I knocked and peered inside. A young firefighter came to my knock at the door and I asked if I could get a couple company t-shirts. He invited me in and we talked, just firefighter banter stuff. He got me a couple t-shirts, and as I was pulling out money for the shirts, he waved me off. He said Fire Department New York was grateful for the many donations made to help them recover.


Ten years after 9-11 the mastermind of the attack is dead. Many of our soldiers have died or been injured on foreign soil protecting our freedom.

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## Zoning Department – Johnson Belford



As we go into late summer, and then early fall you need to be aware of your responsibility as a property owner and or tenant. The City of Canal Fulton has established an Exterior Property Maintenance code. The purpose of this code is to establish minimum standards to maintain the exterior of all buildings in the City and to provide that these buildings are safe, sanitary, do not constitute a blighting influence on the community; to fix responsibilities for owners and occupants of structures that need maintenance; and to provide for the adoption of rules, and to fix responsibilities for owners and occupants of structures that need maintenance; and to provide for the adoption of rules, and to fix penalties for violations thereof.

### Section 1361.03 MAINTENANCE RESPONSIBILITIES

(a) No owner or operator shall occupy, rent or lease, or offer rental or lease, any structure or any part thereof which do not comply with the provisions of this code.

(b) The owner or operator of every building or structure shall be responsible for maintaining a clean, safe and sanitary condition, the shared common areas of the premises, including all yard areas, walks, driveways, parking lots, and including the public sidewalk area adjoining the building on the public right of way. The owner, or operator, shall be responsible for SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL, RUBISH REMOVAL and other obvious activities relative to the maintenance of a safe and sanitary structure.

### Section 903.09 REMOVAL OF WEEDS BY OWNER OR OCCUPANT

The owner, occupant or person having the charge or management of any lot or parcel of land situated within the corporation limits, whether the same be improved or unimproved, vacant or occupied, WITHIN 5 DAYS WRITTEN NOTICE, served in conformity with Ohio R.C. 731.51, shall cut or destroy or cause to be cut or destroyed any noxious or poisonous weeds or vines growing upon any lot or parcel of land, and prevent from blooming or going to seed or EXCEEDING A HEIGHT OF EIGHT INCHES.

### Section 903.10 REMOVAL OF TREES, WEEDS, GRASSES BY MUNICIPALITY

In the event the owner dose not trim or remove any tree, plant or shrubbery, or any part thereof, in accordance with the provisions of this chapter, then the Manager is authorized and it is declared to be his duty to have enforced the provisions of this chapter, and to cause to be trimmed or removed such tree, plant or shrubbery, or part thereof and cut and remove all grass and weeds.

I know that this is a lengthy article, but I wanted to make both the owner and occupant of the property aware of their reasonability's. In the future I will cover a property owner's responsibility for care of tree in the public right of way.

The Canal Fulton Zoning Office is located in the rear of the old fire station, located at 117 North High St., which is located behind Canal Fulton City Hall. Office hours are 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM Monday and Tuesday and 8:00 AM till Noon on Wednesday and Thursday. The phone number is (330) 854-0590.

### Managing Urban Runoff

#### What Homeowners Can Do

To decrease polluted runoff from paved surfaces, households can develop alternatives to areas traditionally covered by impervious surfaces. Porous pavement materials are available for driveways and sidewalks, and native vegetation and mulch can replace high maintenance grass lawns. Homeowners can use fertilizers sparingly and sweep driveways, sidewalks, and roads instead of using a hose. Instead of disposing yard waste, they can use the materials to start a compost pile. And homeowners can learn to use Integrated Pest Management (IPM) to reduce dependence on harmful pesticides.

In addition, households can prevent polluted runoff by picking up after pets and using, storing, and disposing of chemicals properly. Drivers should check their cars for leaks and recycle their motor oil and antifreeze when these fluids are changed. Drivers can also avoid impacts from car wash runoff (e.g., detergents, grime, etc.) by using car wash facilities that do not generate runoff. Households served by septic systems should have them professionally inspected and pumped every 3 to 5 years. They should also practice water conservation measures to extend the life of their septic systems.

## City Manager – Mark Cozy



**Business Assistance Recruitment Calculator** – Mayor Grogan has authorized us to move forward with making our webpage more business friendly with the creation of a business assistance recruitment calculator (BARC). Prospective businesses can now log on to our website and click on a link that takes them to a spreadsheet where they can calculate their costs to run a business in Canal Fulton. By entering data such as meter size, estimated water usage, income, and property valuation a prospective business can estimate taxes and utilities paid in the city.

Many site selection projects today are conducted online. The majority of businesses, developers and site selectors who are using the internet to conduct these location decisions prefer to obtain their information online in a calculator format and prefer not to talk with city staff until they are close to making a final site location decision. The BARC will help the City increase our economic development profile and desirability, becoming more competitive in the world of economic development.

**YMCA Committee** – We recently met with the Property Development Director for the YMCA of the USA. We discussed some preliminary data gleaned from their demographic study which was funded by the YMCA of Central Stark County. Completion of this study gets us one step closer to establishing a charter for a Canal Fulton Area YMCA. We will meet again in October to delve into the issues in greater detail. Two major issues that need to be determined are the site for the YMCA and whether or not our local population can build and sustain an indoor swimming pool.

**Ryan Trewin Memorial Sign** – City Council has recently approved a concept presented by Leslie and Patrick Wyman to erect a brick informational sign at the corner of Cherry and Locust streets to memorialize Ryan Trewin. This will be a memorial sign that will allow the community an opportunity to honor their family members and friends. Their goal is to raise funds for the sign through corporate sponsorships and by offering the community an opportunity to purchase bricks that will be stamped & displayed either in the hardscape brick patio or on the back side of the sign. It is their hope to break ground for the sign early spring 2012. Dependent on the overall cost, there may be other community fundraisers, such as a reverse raffle. Although it is the Ryan Trewin Memorial sign, it is reaching out to all in the community who wish to memorialize their cherished family members and friends. This is a way to give back to a community that gave so much to Ryan Trewin when he needed their thoughts, prayers and support. **Pavement Management Study** – Under the leadership of Councilman Matt Moellendick Canal Fulton has entered into an agreement with CCI Engineering for the creation and implementation of a pavement assessment and management program. The building information modeling that CCI has proposed will provide us with three dimensional plans that can be easily accessed and updated. This would save us time in planning projects, reduce the need for change orders, and avoid potential conflicts as we maintain and improve our streets. CCI will use Canal Fulton as a pilot model for this study at no cost to the City. Councilman Matt Moellendick should be commended for bringing this opportunity to us.

**Safe Routes To Schools Grant** – Last October we had a public meeting to gather input and ideas for a School Travel Plan. A public meeting is scheduled to be held at the Northwest High School, Home Economics Room, on October 19, 2011 at 7:00 PM to present the plan before it is submitted to the Ohio Department of Transportation. Canal Fulton has been approved to apply for federal dollars to improve pedestrian and bicycle access to and throughout the Northwest Local Schools Campus. Details of this meeting will be posted on the City website and announced in the local newspapers.


